Anchor Teens Lend a Hand

Starting the week off with a community service learning project has been giving our local students a great reason to go to school. Every Monday morning, Tim Anderson, a teacher at Fort Bragg High School and instructor with the Anchor Academy, has been getting kids outside to work with the Mendocino Land Trust at Hare Creek Beach, Belinda Point, Seaside Beach and Big River.



Mendocino Land Trust is thrilled to be offering our preserves as a place of re-engagement and inspiration for our local youth, and we are benefitting greatly from their work. From cleaning up the beaches to pulling invasive weeds and even trail maintenance, they are playing an important role and learning about stewardship and responsibility.

"It's a good way to wake up on a Monday," says student Wyatt Lawranson, holding a milk crate of beach trash he had just collected. "We always do trash pickup first ... and it makes you think twice now before throwing something down."

The Anchor Academy is an alternative school within the Fort Bragg High School, and service learning provides a viable alternative to the traditional classroom setting.

Tim, who also teaches math, has been with the Anchor Academy program since it started seven years ago. For some teens, he says, school is a more stable environment than their home situation, so starting the week with an outdoor service activity is a good transition back into to the school week, and they benefit from a lot of one-on-one attention.



"When we are out in the community we see what is actually going on out there. I'm really against littering now, and I even call my friends on it," says Brandon Lugar. The service learning also gives the kids a chance to see what some kinds of work might eventually be like. "I can't see myself working in an office – this gives me the chance to work outside and enjoy it," adds Luis Rocha.

There are several Anchor Academy groups helping out in our community. Some go to the Mendocino Land Trust; others work with the Fort Bragg Food Bank, the Mendocino Coast Humane Society or elementary and middle schools to serve as teaching assistants. Instructor Katrina Tichinin oversees the other types of service learning and has been involved in the Anchor Academy since its inception. The program is available to high school sophomore, junior and senior students, and enrolls about 15-20 students from each grade.
