























Coastal Trails

from north to south

Peter Douglas Trail: 2.3-mile addition to the beautiful Lost Coast Trail. Look for milepost 90.7 on Highway 1 and Usal Rd. Start hiking near Usal campground at Sinkyone State park, or mile marker 4.5 on Usal Rd.

Newport Trail: 1.25-mile segment of the California Coastal Trail for bikes and pedestrians. Trail is parallel to Highway 1 between mileposts 72.15 and 73.55. Parking to be upgraded soon.

Seaside Beach: 0.5-mile long white sandy beach just north of Ten Mile River. Parking around milepost 70.5 on Highway 1.

Noyo Harbor Viewpoint: A nice place to stop and view the working Noyo Harbor. Located on North Harbor Drive.

Hare Creek Beach Trail: 0.7-mile trail to Hare Creek Beach begins at the south end of Mendocino College parking lot- travel south to Bay View Dr., and follow trail to a sandy pocket beach.

Belinda Point Trail: A 1-mile round trip to a lovely rocky cove, 0.75 miles south of the Botanical Gardens. Access from Ocean Dr. (north).

Caspar Uplands Trail: This 1.25-mile long trail starts east of Caspar Beach. Park at the beach, walk up the hill, and wind through the southernmost Sitka spruce forest on the west coast. Trail ends near NE corner of Pt. Cabrillo State Historic Park.

Mendocino Bay Viewpoint: Turn west off Highway 1 at milepost 50.03, look right for a brown and white sign. Great picnic spot with views of Mendocino Village.

Little River Blowhole Trail: 0.5-mile trail to awesome sinkhole just west of Little River Cemetery, through quiet Bishop Pine forest. Limited parking.

Dark Gulch Trail: 0.5-mile trail with stairs down to a secluded rocky pocket beach. Located at milepost 45.24 on Highway 1.

Navarro Blufflands Trail: 0.5-mile trail; park just north of Navarro Ridge Road and Highway 1, milepost 42.5. Great views of seal haul-out rocks.

Navarro Point Preserve and Trail: A 1-mile loop trail and MLT's signature preserve. Sweeping vistas and stunning spring wildflowers.
